Animal Licenses – A Thing of the Past

Like 8-track tapes, City dog and cat licenses are a thing of the past. The City has repealed an ordinance because it wasn't effective or efficient. Only 2,463 dogs and 328 cats - a fraction of the dogs and cats living in Shawnee - were licensed in with the City in 2009.

According to Shawnee Community Services Officers, the vast majority of problems officers deal with involved unlicensed animals. Officers will continue to have equipment to protect public health and to deal with animal behavioral issues.

With the change, pet owners will still have an obligation to vaccinate their animals against rabies and make sure that their dog(s) and/or cat(s) wears an identification tag attached to their collar when they are not indoors or in a vehicle. The tag must contain a telephone number so that an animal can be returned if it becomes separated from their owner. If you have purchased a license in the past and it has not expired, the City will continue to maintain a database of your information, so that your pet can be returned to you using City tag information.

Even though licenses are no longer required, City ordinances still promote responsible pet ownership. Pets can be a rewarding addition to any family, but they come with responsibilities. Courtesy and respect are part of being a good neighbor and

a responsible pet owner. Abiding by leash laws is one of the courtesies that residents should provide. Another is to make sure that pets don't disturb the peace by barking or howling at inappropriate times.

As the weather warms and many of us begin to walk our pets, we need to be mindful of using a pooper scooper as we go. Some of our parks, such as West Flanders, Listowel, KCP&L and Swarner are equipped with pet waste bag dispensers for your convenience. Picking up after your pet and disposing of waste in the sanitary sewer or trash minimizes the risk of spreading illness. This practice also protects our watersheds from those undesirable germs, as well as excess nutrients, which harm the quality of water in our lakes and streams.

If you are experiencing problems with dogs or cats owned by neighbors, we recommend talking to the pet owner first in order to resolve the problem with minimal conflict. If speaking with the pet owner does not resolve the situation, you can contact a Community Services Officer at 742-6098.


Dear Residents,

It is my desire that every citizen and every business feel a part of Shawnee and its City government. Many people don't think about it, but there is no form of government that is closer to you and has more impact on your daily life than your City government. When the house or apartment you live in was built, it was inspected by a City inspector to make sure that it was built to established standards. If there is a sidewalk in front of your house, it was put there because the City had a requirement that the developer or builder put in that sidewalk. Many of the streetlights that light the front of your home are operated and maintained by the City. The roads from your house to your work, school, grocery store are maintained by the City. The stop sign or signal light at the corner that prevents accidents is maintained by the City. The park where your kids go to play soccer, baseball or tennis and the walking trail that you walked on last weekend was built and is maintained by the City. When you dial 9-1-1, the Police car or Fire truck that comes to your house is staffed by City employees. When it rains and the water runs away from your house so that it doesn't flood and goes down in the stormwater drainage system, that system is maintained by your City. The Daddy Daughter Dance, BBQ Contest, and the Summer Concert Series are just a few examples of City events that provide countless hours of family fun. The impact of your City government on your everyday life is tremendous.

It is because that impact is so significant that your engagement is so important. There are many ways to get involved – easy ways, like signing up for our City ListServ, being a Friend on Facebook and following the City on Twitter. E-mail or call councilmembers and let them know your thoughts about the important issues that we face. There is no form of government that provides such a direct opportunity for citizens to weigh in on what is going on where they live. Those of us who have been elected to represent you live in this City and every decision we make impacts our lives as much as it impacts yours.

Of all forms of government, dollar-for-dollar and day-to-day, I'd put my money that we at the City level are the most responsive, most efficient and most likely to have your best interest at heart. More Pet Regs

Multiple Pets

A Special Animal Permit is required to keep more than two dogs over the age of six months or more than two cats over the age of six months. A \$50 initial permit fee is required and an inspection of the shelter and living conditions for the animals is required. For more information, contact the City Clerk's Office at 631-2500.

Stray Cats

There are no leash laws for cats and no agency picks up stray or feral (wild) cats unless they are considered sick or dangerous. If you believe a cat is sick or dangerous, you can contact the Community Services Officer at 742-6098 for assistance.

There are animal welfare groups such as No More Homeless Pets of Kansas City that sponsor programs to help control the population of feral cats. The cats are sterilized so they won't reproduce, then they continue living outdoors. These groups are well versed on where to get traps, how to use them, where to take the cats for sterilization, and what to do afterward. Give them a call at (816) 333-7387 or feel free to contact the City's Community Services Officer for advice.

Lost or Found Pets

You can report a lost or found pet to a Community Services Officer at 742-6098. Animals picked up by the Community Services Officers that cannot be returned to their owner can be taken to Animal Haven, 9827 W. 67th Street, Merriam, Kansas 944-4192. Impounded dogs are held for five days before they may be available for adoption. Cats are held for four days.

Citizen Service Request

Did you know that you can submit your non-emergency service requests on-line to the City 24 hours a day, seven days a week, year round, at www.cityofshawnee.org by clicking on On-line Services?

The Citizen Service Request provides you an opportunity to be actively involved in keeping Shawnee a quality place to live, play and do business. You can submit anything for which you have concerns. You can also request that you be notified when the request is resolved or completed. If a request is submitted electronically, a number is provided so that you can check the status of your request when it is convenient for you.

The City's goal is to provide residents 24-hour access to City Hall. If you do not have Internet access, we encourage you to submit requests the more traditional way, by calling 631-2500 or visiting City Hall.

Senior Citizen Rebates

The City offers refunds to senior citizens on the franchise tax charged on residential telephone bills. Each year the rebate is granted for the previous year's Telephone Franchise Fee.

Senior citizens who turned 62 on or before January 1st of the year for which the refund is granted, are eligible for the rebate. Senior citizens who lived in the City of Shawnee from January 1st to December 31st of the rebate year are eligible.

The refund period is January 1st to April 30th. Qualifying residents may bring proof of age and copies of each telephone bill from the rebate year that shows the "Special Municipal Charge" to the City Clerk's office at City Hall. Application forms are not required. Residents who did not save all their bills can apply for a partial rebate for those months for which they do have their bills, if they can show proof of residency from January 1st to December 31st of the rebate year. Refunds take approximately 4 to 6 weeks to process.

The rebate is only valid on a traditional land line phone service. This rebate is not valid for AT&T U-Verse or Time Warner customers who have bundled services packages. These services use a VoIP data system in which no Franchise Fee tax structure is charged.

Residents who have questions about rebates should contact the City Clerk's Office at 742-6014 or stop by City Hall between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Low Income Rebates

Eligible Shawnee residents may apply quarterly for a refund of the franchise fee paid on gas and electricity bills and the Stormwater Utility Fee paid on property as shown on the annual property tax bill paid to the County. The franchise fee amounts to be rebated may be identified on monthly gas and electric bills as "Shawnee Franchise Fee," "Franchise Fee," or "Special Municipal Charge." Franchise fees for Kansas Gas Service, Atmos Gas, Western Resources, and Kansas City Power and Light are 2% from April 1, 2010 to December 31, 2010 and then will be 5% on and after January 1, 2011. Eligible residents are those who have a "Very Low Income," as defined by the U.S. Department of Urban Housing Development (HUD) guidelines for the Johnson County Area Median Family Income.

Community Shredding Event

Tax season has arrived and there's no better time than the present to clean out your personal files. The City is hosting the 3rd annual community shredding event on Saturday, May 7th, from 10:00 a.m. to 12 Noon.

The event will be located in the Splash Cove parking lot at the Jim Allen Aquatic Center (57th and King). This event is free to the public; however, a suggested donation of \$5 per regular banker box and \$10 per large banker box is suggested. Money collected will help cover the cost of shredding and the remainder will be donated to the Mayor's Christmas Tree Fund.

Electronics Recycling

Get a new computer for Christmas? Don't know what to do with the old one? You're in luck! The City is working with *Extreme Recycling* to host the 4th annual consumer electronics recycling event on Saturday, May 7th, from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. in the Splash Cove parking lot at the Jim Allen Aquatic Center located at 57th and King.

Consumer electronics can be conveniently dropped off for recycling - there will be a small fee depending on the item. Electronic waste recycling provides citizens and businesses the opportunity to preserve and protect the environment. Last year, over 20,000 pounds of electronics were collected and recycled. Bike Collection

Have your kids outgrown their bikes? Do you have a bike that you never ride? The City will be collecting bikes to donate and redistribute through various community service organizations. Bike collection will be May 7th in the Splash Cove parking lot from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. This collection is just one more way the City continues to be a bike friendly community!

Tidy Town

Tidy Town, the City's large item pick-up will take place for residents who live east of Pflumm on **Saturday, April 30th** and for residents who live west of Pflumm on **Saturday, May 7th**.

Your trash hauler will be responsible this year for picking up these items. This service is included in your basic rate. Contact your hauler for specific instructions that they might have and a list of items that they will pick up.

Remember, do not place hazardous materials such as car batteries, paints, solvents, or liquid waste out for collection. Call Johnson County Environmental Department for disposal of these items at 715-6900.

Trash and Recycling

The new Pay-As-You-Throw trash and recycling ordinance went into effect January 1, 2011. We would like to offer you a few tips and reminders:

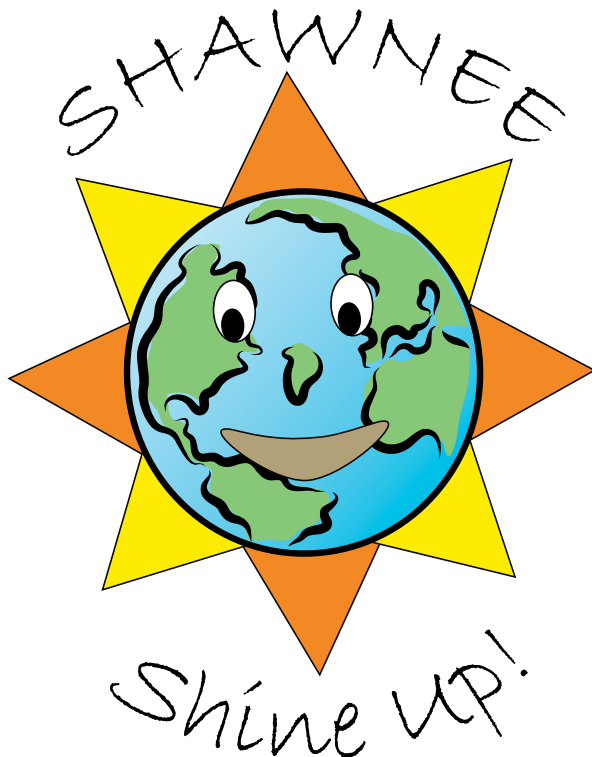
- Remember trash that does not fit into your trash container requires one sticker on each additional bag. If you are a Deffenbaugh or Superior customer, you can purchase stickers at City Hall. A-1 customers can contact their hauler directly to obtain stickers.
- You have unlimited recycling!
- Your bins should be stored behind the building setback line or existing building line.
- Bins can be put out 24 hours before collection and should be removed 12 hours after collection.
- Homes Associations have until August 1st to update contracts and haulers have until August 1st to have both trash and recycling carts distributed.

A Bright Idea

The City is shining a new light on street light options. As part of the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG), the City is piloting test areas for LED and Induction lighting technologies on City streets. This included street lighting modifications at Shawnee Crossings, and on Johnson Drive (west of the I-435 bridge).

As a result of this funding opportunity, many of the 30' street lights have been replaced with a LED street light fixtures. Induction light fixtures have been utilized on the shorter 14' street lights. Both of these lightning technologies have the potential to reduce energy consumption by 40% or more and are rated to last over 10 years. The City will gain first hand experience with these lighting systems on a large enough scale to provide guidance for future street lighting decisions and practices.

Social Media and Policing

The use of social media is quickly gaining momentum and standing as an inexpensive communication tool that has the ability to reach all members of a community. In 2011, the Police Department will be working with other City Departments to broaden and enhance their use of these communication outlets.

Law enforcement has traditionally shared information with the public through television, radio and print media. Social media allows for government entities to engage the community through an avenue of two-way communication. The benefits of this include immediacy of information in relation to the newspaper or television, an expanded audience, and the advantage of improved interaction with the public. The uses of social media in law enforcement are countless, but a few include: Alerts of real time dangers to the community, educational and prevention information, community events, and an enhanced dialogue with the community where public comments and feedback allow for proper response.

The City's social media initiative is a centralized effort where all departments are represented through the same outlets. The Police Department encourages residents to sign up for ListServ, become a Friend on Facebook and following the City on Twitter.

April is Fair Housing Month

April is Fair Housing Month. There are a wide variety of housing opportunities in the City ranging from affordable rental and ownership housing to upper bracket homes. The City has adopted a Fair Housing Policy committed to provide, within constitutional limitations, fair housing. This policy covers both the sale and rental of housing. The City has supported the provision of housing opportunities in a wide range of home process, types and rental rates. It is supportive of the right for fair housing without regard to race, color, national origin, religion, sex, familial status (families with children under 18, or who are expecting a child), or disabled. Clear Creek Trail

The Clear Creek Trail Phase II project has been completed. This multi-use facility consists of approximately one-mile of 10-foot wide concrete trail for walking, jogging, and bicycling. The trail alignment starts on the west side of Monticello Road at an existing entry point into Gamblin Park. The trail will cross beneath Monticello Road at two existing bridges, continue east on the north side of Clear Creek through park property, and terminate at Woodstock Street, which is located just west of Woodland Road. With the completion of the trail, an alternate form of transportation to and from residential, retail and commercial areas as well as public facilities is available. This trail will promote the City's expanding Safe Routes to School program. Area residents will have the ability to walk or ride a bicycle to these destinations instead of using the traditional motorized vehicle which will result in the reduction of emissions and improve air quality. The City has received a grant for phase III. Construction is scheduled to begin in 2011 and will provide trail access to the Johnson County Streamway Trails.

Spring Tips

As the temperatures begin to warm around the City, outdoor activities jump into full swing. Whatever your activity of choice, it is important to remember how our activities affect our nearby lakes, ponds and streams. Here are a few things you can do to help keep Shawnee's waters clean:

1. Use fertilizers sparingly and sweep up driveways, sidewalks and gutters as the chemicals pollute our waterways.
2. Never dump anything down storm drains or in the streams.
3. Vegetate bare spots in your yard to be sure that water run-off is properly filtered and your yard does not erode away. Compost your yard waste properly.
4. Use the least toxic pesticides, follow labels and learn how to prevent pest problems.
5. Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces; consider a rain garden to capture runoff.
6. Take your car to the car wash instead of washing it in the driveway and also check your car for engine fluid leaks.

Storm Drainage Project

A Storm Management Advisory Council (SMAC) project included in the City's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is scheduled to begin this Spring. The project will target 57th Street and Quivira. Funding for this project is through County SMAC funds and the City's Parks and Pipes program. The stormwater drainage improvements will be an extension of the past improvements between Cody and Quivira and will include construction of a new storm sewer. Kansas Gas and WaterOne will also be relocating utilities. This three phase project is scheduled to begin this Spring with an estimated completion date of June 1, 2011. The first phase will involve installation of a large box culvert, east of Quivira Road. The second phase will involve the removal and installation of the box culvert under Quivira Road and the third phase will involve installation of miscellaneous storm sewer along 57th Street, west of Quivira Road. Phase II construction will require that Quivira Road be completely shut down between 57th and 55th Street, except for local traffic. The maximum time the Contractor is allowed to close down Quivira Road is one week.

National Flood Insurance Program

The City participates in the National Flood Insurance Program which makes flood insurance available to everyone in the City. If you are in or near the floodplain, we recommend that you talk to your insurance agent and seriously consider purchasing flood insurance. Most homeowner's insurance policies do not cover damage from floods.

Be sure to check your policy to ensure you have adequate coverage. Usually these policies cover the building structure, but not the contents. Contents coverage can also be obtained by asking. There is a 30-day waiting period before flood insurance coverage becomes effective. Plan ahead; do not wait until a flood is predicted before purchasing flood insurance. FEMA Flood Hazard Areas

On August 3, 2009, FEMA's National Flood Insurance Program issued new maps for most of the Johnson County area. These maps more accurately show all of the Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHA) in Shawnee. The SFHA are the high-risk flooding areas in the 100-Year floodplain. The 100-year floodplain is the area that will be flooded on the average of once every 100 years. If your property is in the newly identified floodplain, FEMA has provided reduced insurance rate options. For information about the reduced rates, visit www.FloodSmart.gov/PRPEExtension.
